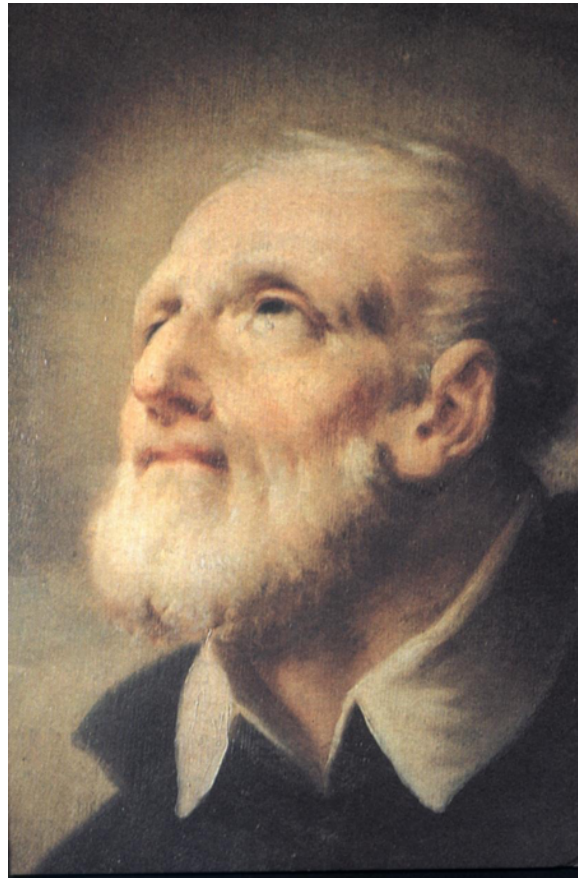


# *Exercises for Purity*

## *Why pray through St. Philip's Intercession?*

St. Philip Neri (1515-1595) is a saint uniquely fitted to lead us toward greater purity. Leaving his native Florence he came to Rome by divine guidance, and after a period of discernment set about ministering to people of every state and circumstance. Eventually he would be ordained a priest. Armed with the sacraments and his own attractive personality Philip led people to experience the Love of God their Father. Using all the instruments of culture to bring others close to Christ, Philip and his companions brought about numerous ongoing conversions through Confession and frequent reception of the Eucharist. **At the heart of Philip's evangelization was a childlike purity.** He saw the world as God sees it... and so he loved the world as God loves it. This unadulterated love of the good things God created allowed Philip to live chastity throughout his life, but also gave him an unwavering confidence in miracles large and small. The personal development of his followers was always his greatest joy, but there were other extraordinary events: uncountable cures, the suppression of earthquakes, visions, his ability to read souls, and even the raising of the dead, to name a few. Two lines from 19th-century hymns to St. Philip give us good reason to befriend him:

*If you seek miracles you will surely find them, if there is no sin in your heart.*

*Love is his bond, he knows no other fetter,  
Asks not our all, but takes whate'er we spare him,  
Willing to draw us on from good to better,  
As we can bear him.*

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# *Prayers and Inspirational Phrases of St. Philip*

## E poi?

St. Philip was known for bringing people to conversion. One of the easiest tools he used in this effort was this simple phrase, “*E poi?*” (“*and then...?*”). It was a gentle reminder that all our actions have consequences and that death waits for all of us... and what then?

*Preferisco paradiso. - I prefer paradise.*

## *Examen*

Like his good friend and colleague, St. Ignatius Loyola, St. Philip counseled a regular examination of conscience and frequent confession to prepare for the ultimate help in pursuing virtue: offering our sacrifices at mass and receiving Holy Communion. Many examinations of conscience exist, but one of the most simple and effective is a regular meditation on the Beatitudes and the Commandments each night before bed.

### The Beatitudes (Mt. 5:1-11, cf Knox)

Jesus, when he saw how great was their number, went up on to the mountain-side; there he sat down, and his disciples came about him. And he began speaking to them; this was the teaching he gave.

Blessed are the poor in spirit; the kingdom of heaven is theirs.

Blessed are the patient; they shall inherit the land.

Blessed are those who mourn; they shall be comforted.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for holiness; they shall have their fill.

Blessed are the merciful; they shall obtain mercy.

Blessed are the clean of heart; they shall see God.

Blessed are the peace-makers; they shall be counted the children of God.

Blessed are those who suffer persecution in the cause of right; the kingdom of heaven is theirs. Blessed are you, when men revile you, and persecute you, and speak all manner of evil against you falsely, because of me.

The Commandments  
(Ex. 20 1-17, cf Knox)

And now God spoke all these words which follow.

I, the Lord, am thy God (he said); I, who rescued thee from the land of Egypt, where thou didst dwell in slavery.

Thou shalt not defy me by making other gods thy own.

Thou shalt not carve images, or fashion the likeness of anything in heaven above, or on earth beneath, or in the waters under the earth, to bow down and worship it. I, thy God, the Lord Almighty, am jealous in my love; be my enemy, and thy children, to the third and fourth generation, for thy guilt shall make amends; love me, keep my commandments, and mercy shall be thine a thousandfold.

Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God lightly on thy lips; if a man uses that name lightly, the Lord will not acquit him of sin.

Remember to keep the sabbath day holy. Six days for drudgery, for doing all the work thou hast to do; when the seventh day comes, it is a day of rest, consecrated to the Lord thy God. That day, all work shall be at an end, for thee and every son and daughter of thine, thy servants and serving-women, thy beasts, too, and the aliens that live within thy gates. It was six days the Lord spent in making heaven and earth and sea and all that is in them; on the seventh day he rested, and that is why the Lord has blessed the sabbath day, and hallowed it.

Honour thy father and thy mother; so thou shalt live long to enjoy the land which the Lord thy God means to give thee.

Thou shalt do no murder.

Thou shalt not commit adultery.

Thou shalt not steal.

Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour.

Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's house, or set thy heart upon thy neighbour's wife, or servant or hand-maid or ox or ass or anything else that is his.

## *Prayer for Purity*

*Bl. John Henry Newman*

St. Philip, who didst always preserve the white lily of thy purity unsullied, with such great honour to thyself that the brightness of this fair virtue dwelt in thine eyes, shone forth from thy hands, and cast its fragrance over thy whole body, causing it to emit so sweet a perfume that it gave consolation, fervour, and devotion to all who conversed with thee; obtain me from the Holy Spirit of God so true a love for that virtue, that neither the words nor bad examples of sinners may ever make any impression upon my soul. Never permit me in any way to lose that lovely virtue; and since avoidance of occasions, prayer, labour, humility, frequent use of the Sacraments, were the arms with which thou didst conquer the flesh, which is our worst enemy, so do thou obtain for me grace to use the same arms to vanquish the same foe. Take not away thy help from me; but be as zealous for me as thou wast during thy life for thy penitents, keeping them far removed from all sensual infection. Do this for me, my holy Patron; and be ever my protector in respect of this fair virtue.

## *Prayer for a Good Death*

## *A Reflection on Divine Love*

In the eyes of the world, and among people who are weak and of little fervor, inspirations, colloquies and experiences of the soul pass for a myth and a deceit. But one who is truly enlightened realizes their truth within himself. There is a spiritual fire which is first felt in the heart and which sometimes, like an indescribable stream, inflames the breast and the face. There is a supreme prayer which surpasses all human experience and which does not take the form of words, but in which the spirit, illuminated by celestial light, is raised to God in a complete union of all the senses, and the prayer flows on like a copious stream. In these brief moments it says things so exalted that when it has returned to itself, it can no longer express them nor conceive them. O blessed spirit of God! How completely it fills, consoles, and makes itself silently felt in the interior of the soul, which it causes to languish utterly with love; how, in a moment, it teaches and impresses on the well-beloved all that it pleases and wills...so that, melted by these delights, the human soul is raised and elevated to a height of love so great that it forgets its carnal nature, and utters words that seem like blasphemy, as is related of Moses and St. Paul... Sometimes the beloved yields herself so completely to her spouse, and so freely, that, in her supreme ardor and amazement, unable to bear it any longer, she beseeches him to leave her. Then the spouse, in order to kindle yet greater fires, and to make her languish the more and transfix her with his virginal love, shows his reluctance to leave her, so that the beloved is forced to cry out in secret, "I can bear it no more, I can bear no more; leave me now, for I am dying, I am dying." Then the soul suffers violence and makes efforts as though to leave the body and takes flight to the bosom of her spouse, who at that moment withdraws his sensible presence, but not his grace; and the body is left

inert, her limbs all bruised, inebriated and scorched with love, her power of speech gone from her. Yet she can find no rest because of the absence of her spouse, and desires him the more; then, as it were, mad with love she seeks him day and night, and finds him not, though oft-times he is hidden within her, though she knows it not, to increase within her a yet greater love of him and infinite desire. At last he allows her to discover him in diverse ways: sometimes in groaning and great fervor of heart; oft-times when the soul abases and humbles herself and realizes she is not worthy of him, and never has been worthy of him; often too, in frequent prayer ; but much more often when she receives the Blessed Sacrament... Oh! What ineffable joy the beloved experiences when, without expecting him, he makes his presence felt! What a sacred visitation that is! What holy colloquies ensue, wounding the heart with love, when the beloved is all absorbed in him, and attentive to the smallest sign! All that she does and feels... becomes insupportable to her. It is with great violence and repugnance that she nourishes her miserable body, with the one thought that it may be sustained and made to serve the spirit.
